Re-election of the Committee

All members of the committee were re-elected for another year. Stuart thanked the committee members for their continued support.

Treasurers Report

DCRA Treasurer's Report September 2023cr

The decision was taken at the 2022 AGM to no longer issue £20 cheques when a member has passed away. Instead every year a charity will be selected by the members and a £100 donation will be issued to that charity in memory of all those who have passed away. The charity selected at the meeting for the 2023 donation was Alzheimer's Society, thank you letter received. The charity for 2023 will be agreed at this AGM.

The walking group no longer receives financial support from DCRA as we no longer receive funding from Dow. The balance of £16.17 has been returned to the DCRA account.

Liability Insurance cost is increasing each year. Alternative policies were investigated to try to reduce the cost in 2022 but no suitable alternative was found. The renewal notice for 2023 has been received and cost this year reduced slightly from £380.53 to £372.03 and has been renewed.

Membership Report

We now have 214 members, 2 new members since last meeting, Laura and Aaron Griffiths **Walking group Report**

Stuart went through the walking group report.

The July walk saw seven walkers gather in the 'hard to find' roadside car park hidden in the bracken above Darren near Llangattock. One person could not find it so returned home very frustrated. It was the start of an interesting day. The first section of the walk was to walk along the flank of the hill and gradually climb the escarpment above to reach the rock structure named the 'Lonely Shepherd' but after walking for less than an hour one walker experienced a medical incident that required calling for an ambulance. We managed to assist the walker down to the nearby road where an ambulance car and medic gave the walker an intensive medical examination but could not establish any cause for the incident. It was decided that five remaining walkers would continue the walk whilst the patient and companion would travel home. The remaining five walkers completed about two thirds on the intended 7 mile walk in fine weather. A foul weather forecast delayed the August walk in the Black Mountain by a week when 7 hardy walkers turned out to travel to Tafarn y Garreg in the Swansea valley to climb steeply up onto Fan Hir, Fan Brycheiniog (802 metres, where we had a late lunch in the round circle of stones) before pressing on to Fan Foel (781 metres), where the route returned to Fan Brycheiniog, still lost in the low cloud so no astounding views which was very disappointing, then steeply down the rocky escarpment steps to Llyn y Fan Fawr and southwards along the glacial moraines. There was an abnormally high amount of water coming off the hillside making stream crossings exciting, especially for some. The later part of the return path was horrible, wet, muddy and absolutely loaded with upstanding stones and bracken so you had to watch intently where you placed your feet. The 10 mile walk took almost 7 hours to complete and was reclassified as tough by the group.

The September walk was one the group has done a number of times, Fan y Big and Taf Fechan Forest from Torpantau car park on the Pontsticill to Talybont road. At 8 miles and moderate it attracted 8 walkers in favourable weather who thoroughly enjoyed the experience and views with many photos being taken, at least one with a brave walker stood out on the 'diving board' (a protruding stone overhanging the rockface) looking over the valley and drovers track far below. Returning to Torpantau the walk was adjudged as a good day out with Simon kindly leading the walk in Stuart's absence.

Secretaries Report

There were no matters arising from the previous minutes or any other minutes for the year. Very little email traffic at all.

Brewing and Fermentation group Report

So far this year we have had 3 beer tasting meetings (the next is 3rd Nov). On average we get between 4 and 6 people attending and we try about 1/3 pint of anything up to 10 different beers that have been brewed within the group. Beers are scored out of 10 considering the aroma, bitterness, aftertaste, and personal preferences. Lunch is provided and the sessions are relaxed and jovial especially towards the end!

We always have a couple of challenge beers which are suggested by the group as well as our randomly generated beer. This is decided by the throw of a dice (or3). A table of different colours of beer, bitterness and strength was drawn up and 3 dice are thrown to determine the beer to be brewed. Apart from that the types of malt, the hops and the process is up to the brewer and can result in some very interesting beers.

The challenge beers sampled at our last meeting were a Royal Oak (Eldridge Pope) and 322 which were the dice throws (11-15 colour units (amber in colour), 4 4.4% alcohol and 30 units of bitterness).

The best beer of the day was deemed to be the Royal Oak from Richard and the worst beer of the day was an experimental Norwegian farmhouse beer brewed with Juniper also by Richard (comments included "tastes like floor cleaner" others cannot be reported here!).
