#### REPORT TO 14th JUNE 2022 MEETING

The walk scheduled for 6th April was deferred at short notice owing to an adverse weather forecast (high wind and heavy rain in our faces) until the 13th which at least started out with better weather from Llantrisant Forest car park. Unfortunately, it wasn't too long before it started to spot with rain and ultimately provide steady rain as we broached out of the woods and out onto the ridge going westward together with visibility steadily reducing to less than 50 metres. The walk leader Simon Acey had two options when we reached the decision point and the group decided to take the shorter option straight down into Llanharan, where it was dry and as we turned eastward and upwards the sun came out so we stopped for lunch. After a delightful walk up through up through the meadows and down the forest track the 14 walkers arrived back at the car park for a slice of cake provided by Philippa.

George Sawicki was the key actor and leader for the May walk which was centred on the hills above Crickhowell. Thirteen walkers set off up the Beacons Way, turning off up a valley towards Pen Cerrig-calch where the 5 most energetic walkers led by George set out for Pen Gloch-y-pibwr and Pen Allt-mawr, returning via Pen Cerrig-calch and Table Mountain, whilst Stuart led the older more sensible walkers up to the last two mentioned points, all returning to Crickhowell. The weather was kind with some sunshine and a cooling breeze. The long walk was 10 miles, the shorter was 7 miles, with climbs of 750 and 650 metres. It was a tough, enjoyable, good days walking. The views were stunning.

The June walk was part one of a two part 'Penrhys Pilgrimage Way' walk that starts at Llandaff Cathedral and finishes in Penrhys, a pilgrimage walk of 20 miles. This month's walk was 10 miles linear route from Llandaff to Llantrisant, via Radyr, Creigiau, Greosfaen across farmland and along lanes. Only 4 walkers turned out but they had an invite to have coffee and cake at the Dam's house in Radyr. Sue Taylor joined us for coffee but declined the walk, which was unexpectedly delightful with sunken lanes, grass paths and superb views all in rain free, sunny day. We had a brief look around the older, higher areas of Llantrisant before walking down a steep cobbled street to catch the bus back to Llandaff. A good day out. Part 2 of the walk is scheduled for September. NB: Only one stile!

### **Brewing and Fermentation group Report**

Richard ran through the activities of the brewing group which consisted of a beer brew off and tasting at the end of May. The beer we decided to try to brew was a Wye Valley Bitter Clone. The general recipe was that it should have an original gravity of around 1036 (ABV at 3 to 3.5%), colour of 6 SRM, mid brown, and a bitterness of 30 to 40 IBU. Paul's was called Wye Not! and Richard's was called Wye's Crack. Full recipes can be obtained on request.

There were 3 people at this tasting and apart from the 2 Wye Valley bitter look-alike's we tried 5 other beers listed below

Beer Beer type and comments Score Sundon Brewery, Paul H

Wye Valley Bitter Clone, Wye Not

Bitter, good colour, floral aroma, slight bitterness, yeast flavour.

Whispering Knight

Bitter, Liquorice, floral aroma, some initial bitterness and good after taste.

Beach Hut Brewery, Richard T

Wye Valley Bitter Clone, Wye's Crack

Bitter, slightly hazy. Floral aroma some grassy notes, good initial bitterness and bitter after taste, not very malty,

Sour Dohhhh (Experimental)

Bitter, made using sour dough bread. Cloudy. Caramel and dark malt flavours, malt loaf and brown bread. Some bitterness with a sharp bitter aftertaste. Needs more work.

Bamber's starter for 10 (Experimental)

Pale Bitter, made with sour dough bread and fermented with sour dough starter but no brewer's yeast. Cloudy. Acidic, floural, pear drops aroma. Odd. Some bitterness, Listerine, anticeptic after taste. Not good.

**Buzz Wheat Beer** 

Wheat Beer. Very pale. Some banana and clove aromas, not very much bitterness. Good fizz.

Black Hole IPA, Bottled

Black IPA. Little or no aroma slight chocolate. Burned malt, not stout, bitter back note good bitter aftertaste.
